It provides an excellent opportunity to interact with the American Politics faculty outside of the classroom and, for advanced graduate students actively engaged in scholarly research, the workshop can also be an invaluable source of professional advice. Over the summer, 6 students participated in the CAPC internship program. Internship sites included Congressman Steny Hoyer's D.C. office, the USDA, and Freedom House an independent watchdog organization dedicated to the expansion of freedom and democracy around the world.

In early June, our joint poll with the *Washington Post* was released, which focused on the Maryland gubernatorial election. The poll found that Governor Larry Hogan has high approval and popularity ratings from both Republican and Democratic voters.

"With an approval rating above 50% across almost every category of voters—even among Democrats—Governor Hogan is the counter example to the rampant polarization sweeping the country," said Associate

Professor of Government and Politics Michael Hanmer, research director of UMD's <u>Center for American</u> <u>Politics and Citizenship</u> (CAPC). "The results from this poll show Marylanders are not discounting Hogan's achievements just because he's a member of the Republican Party."



Deconstructing Race / Reconstructing Difference:

Beyond the U.S. Paradigm



Abstract:

In this moment of a turn to identity politics in the United States, mitigating the detrimental impacts of ideologies and hierarchies predicated on the idea of race is ever more important. Although race is not a scientific fact, it is a social fact that operates through ascribed categories anchored in a white/black binary with other color-coded categories capriciously placed in between. These structured not only accentuate difference; they also sow division. Based on a conceptual framework of "micro-cultures" drawn from analyses of extensive, ethnographic interviews with people who are socially defined within each of the five main, ascribed racial categories in the U.S., this presentation argues for ways to move beyond the severe limitations of current narratives of race and difference. It further argues that the role of education is imperative in understanding the complexities and contradictions of how race and difference are enacted and also critical for challenging and progressively changing these social constructions in the U.S. and internationally.
