# **Political Parties**

Parties are a central feature of the American political system, but they remain poorly understood. In this class we will survey their role in contemporary politics in both political institutions and the electorate. We will learn about parties' evolution over the course of U.S. history. We will explore topics such as shifts in party coalitions, parties' evolving structures, parties' role in policymaking, regulation of parties and trends in attitudes about parties.
