Course Description and Objectives:

Welcome to Social Psychology! I am looking forward to getting to know all of you and sharing in this learning process. I am interested in each of you achieving your personal goals for this course and will help you in whatever way I can. From your instructor (me), you can expect: clear expectations, fairness in evaluations, respectful treatment, and assistance in achieving your goals. In return, I expect from students (you): respectful treatment of your peers and myself, your best effort in all coursework, and willingness to ask for help when needed. Making this course work each of you is a team effort involving me, you, and your classmates.

Throughout this course, you will:

- 1. Learn about the theoretical principles and processes concerning the study of the *social self* (or the ways in which we are shaped by the world around us and the ways in which we shape the world).
- 2. Strengthen your ability to consume and utilize psychological research to help evaluate conflicting ideas, examine interesting phenomena, and reflect on the social world with a mind to biases that lead to racism, sexism and other social problems.
- 3. Strengthen your ability to write scientifically about psychological phenomena.
- 4. Strengthen your ability to discuss and debate psychological phenomena.

Course Operation

Tuesday: Lecture Sessions

On Mondays, class sessions will consist of lecture-style teaching, aided by demonstrations, class discussions, short videos, and/or activities. The textbook for this course introduces debates in the literature, but does not thoroughly cover basic social psychological concepts and theories. This means you will have to come to class to get the majority of this course's material. My goal is to lecture in an accessible, helpful, and enthusiastic way that will aid in your acquirement of the material.

Thur: Discussion/videos/worksheets

On most Wednesdays, class sessions will be in a more dynamic learning format, which means the class have some lecture at the beginning and then will watch and discuss a video or will do and discuss worksheets based on current subject material.

Application Assignments:

These are deeper written discussions of certain subjects and you will work on this writing assignment outside of class (See Application Assignments section).

Quizzes: Quizzes will be focused on the textbook as supplement to material covered in the lectures and may be used for review prior to exams.

Posted PowerPoints:

Before each class, you can download or review the PowerPoint associated with the particular lesson being covered. It is your job to fill in the blanks on the PowerPoint based on the lecture. These guided notes help facilitate learning by actively involving you in the lecture and will turn into great study guides for the exams.

Course Requirements:

Overview:

In this course I am evaluating you on three criteria: knowledge acquisition, skill acquisition, and participation in class activities/discussions. Knowledge acquisition means the extent to which you have absorbed and understand the course materials presented in class and in the text, including the basics of social psychology, key terms, theories, debates, etc. You will have the opportunity to demonstrate your knowledge acquisition through exams. Skill acquisition means the extent to which you demonstrate development of key aptitudes that will be transferable to a broad array of contexts beyond the domain of psychology. Specifically, you will have opportunities to demonstrate your writing, oral communication, and teamwork skills through application assignments, a final paper, group work (though not in-person), and in-class discussion worksheets. Participation means the extent to which you aid in creating a classroom community in which we learn from one another and interact hands-on with course material. You will have opportunities to demonstrate participation during class discussions.

Exams (40% of your final grade, 200 points):

There will be 2 non-cumulative, multiple-choice exams each covering approximately one-half of the course material presented (including lectures and the textbook). Please come on exam days prepared with a laptop or some other means to take exam in Canvas. If this is a difficulty, please contact me ASAPpencils and your ID.

Grade: Each of the exams are worth 100 points.

Exam Makeup policy

Make-up exams will be permitted on a case by case basis (generally if you have a University-approved excused absence (see university policies at end of syllabus))

Application Assignments (24% of your final grade, 135 points):

Throughout the course, you will be assigned 3 short papers and one optional paper (~500 words) that will ask you to choose a concept learned in class and experience or apply it outside of the classroom (see "Course Schedule" for dates).

<u>Grade:</u> Each of the 3 assignments is worth 45 points. You must turn in assignments you have selected to write on by their due date and by **11:59PM**, online on the course website. Late assignments will lose points, unless you have a University-approved excused absence (see university policies at end of syllabus) that covers an extensive period of time (i.e., not the day before the assignment is due).

Quizzes: Quizzes will be completed on Canvas each week. You will have 20 minutes to complete the quiz. The lowest 3 quiz grades will be dropped. There are 10 quizzes so you will only see 7 reflected in your grade. You may not make up quizzes without an approved excuse.

Participation worksheets (2.5% of your final grade, 10 points)

Participation will involve a worksheet. These worksheets will be similar to questionnaires in the textbook. There will be 5 throughout the course.

<u>Grade</u>: Each of the 5 worksheets are worth 4 points. Worksheets can only be made up for University-approved excused absences (see university policies at end of syllabus).

Final Analysis Paper (18% of your final grade, 90 points):

A 5-page, typed, double-spaced paper is due on **May 4** before 11:59PM on the course website. This paper is meant to be a longer version of the application assignments and allows you to choose the topic. Specifically, the task for the final paper is to identify a future personal or professional obstacle or goal and then discuss a social psychological phenomenon that would inform your behavior in overcoming that obstacle or meeting that goal. For example, you may have a personal goal of being a good parent. What knowledge from social psychology can help you achieve that goal? As another example, if you want to be a top executive someday you may envision yourself having issues with effectively leading others (a professional obstacle). What knowledge from social psychology can help you achieve that goal? You will be charged with thoroughly explaining your goal or obstacle and how knowledge gained from social psychological research could help you in achieving this goal or overcoming this obstacle. You will have to incorporate at least four academic journal articles into your paper. The requirements for this assignment will be discussed further in the writing workshop.

<u>Grade:</u> The final analysis paper is 18% of your final grade (90 points). Late papers will not be accepted, unless you have a University-approved excused absence (see university policies at end of syllabus) that covers an extensive amount of time (i.e., not the day before the paper is due).

Participation: Wednesday Participation worksheets track participation as well as class interactions

<u>Grade</u>: Participation is worth 4% **of your grade** (20 points). Every student can miss one participation worksheet without penalty ("excused absences").

Extra Credit Opportunities

This course may offer extra credit opportunities.

How to Do Well in This Course:

Everyone has different strategies for achieving their goals in a course, and what works for some may not work for others. However, my experience and observation of others have led me to believe that there are some general tips that seem to help most people:

- 1. Attend Class: As stated earlier, attending class well help elaborate on information from the text, as well as introduce you to new information. Also, much of the material presented in class is not in the textbook. The exams specifically only include materials presented in class. Being in the classroom and actively listening and taking notes is the best way to do well in a course. Also, for your in-class participation grade, attending is the only way to get these points.
- 2. Read the Text: **Starting early is always better.** The reading load is typically ~20 pages per week. Reading a chapter a week will be much easier than trying to read 100+ pages the night before an exam.
- 3. Office Hours: Come visit me! I am here to answer your questions and give you feedback. It's always better to ask for help early in the semester than to wait until the last week, when there's not much I can do to help you turn around your grade in the course.
- 4. Participate: There will be times when I ask you to discuss topics with your classmates or take part in an activity. These experiences will add to your knowledge by giving you hands-on experience with psychological concepts.
- 6. There are extra resources on Canvas, such as practice quizzes, E Flash cards and additional videos in each module use them.
